
Sowing Seeds for Life

WOMEN'S HISTORY: Chairman Gloria Schaff

MILESTONES IN WOMEN'S HISTORY Through decades of activism and organizing, these women made history 1926 through1930.

1926: Gertrude "Queen of the Waves" Ederle (An Olympic gold medalist) did what only five women had done before her when she swam the 35-mile length of the English Channel on Aug. 6, 1926.

1927: Five Canadian women's rights activists, dubbed the "Famous Five," petition to become 'persons' in Canada. They brought a case before the country's Supreme Court arguing that

women had the right to be appointed to the Senate.

1928: Britain's Equal Franchise Act becomes law. British women technically won the right to vote before Americans, but it took 10 years for them to achieve the same voting rights men already had. The Equal Franchise Act removed all restrictions; any British citizen over 21 was now free to vote.

1929: Nigeria's Women's War wins rights. The native Igbo women used their powerful communication networks to stage a nonviolent protest against their mistreatment. British colonial rule in Nigeria wildly changed how the country was governed.

1930: Screenwriter Frances Marion and actress Mary Pickford were some of early Hollywood's biggest names. The two worked together to adapt dozens of novels and stories into films, from classics like "Anne of Green Gables," to "The Big House," which won Marion her first Oscar.
